














REPAT. ANZAC SERVICE

We talked and laughed for days, about the things you've done and seen'

'He really is a comfort, and works hard around the farm.

I read the same hope in his eyes, that you won't come to harm.

Mc Connell's kids rode Billy, but suddenly that has changed.

We had a violent lightning storm, and it was really strange.'

'Last Wednesday, just on midnight, not a single cloud in sight,

It raged for several minutes, it gave us all a fright.

It really spooked your Billy ... and he screamed and bucked and reared,

And then he rushed the sliprail fence, which by a foot he cleared'

'They brought him back next afternoon, but something's changed I fear,

It's like the day you brought him home, for no one can get near.

Remember when you caught him, with his black and flowing mane?

Now Horse Breakers fear the beast, that only you can tame.'

'That's why we need you home son Then the flow of ink went dry

This letter was unfinished ... and I couldn't work out why.

Until I started reading, the letter, number three A yellow telegram delivered news of a tragedy. Her son killed in action ... Oh! What pain that must have been.

the same date as her letter ... 3rd November 1917

This letter which was never sent, became then one of three.

She sealed behind the photo's face ... the face she longed to see.

And John's home town's children, when he went to war,

Would say no greater cattleman, had left the town before.

They knew his widowed mother well, and with respect did tell,

How when she lost her only boy ... she lost her mind as well.

She could not face the awful truth, to strangers she would speak

"My Johnny's at the war you know ... he's coming home next week."

They all remembered Bluey, he stayed on to the end.

A young man with wooden leg, became her closest friend.

And he would go and find her when she wandered, old and weak,

and always softly say ... 'Yes dear ... John will be coming home next week.'

Then when she died, Bluey moved on ... to Queensland some did say.

I tried to find out where he went, but don't know to this day.

And Kathy never wed, a lonely spinster... some found odd.

She wouldn't set foot in a church ... she'd turned her back on God.

John's mother left no Will, I learned, on my detective trail.

This explains my photo's journey, of that clearance sale.

That last day in October back in 1917, at 4pm our brave boys fell ... that sad fact I did glean.

That's when John's life was sacrificed, the record's crystal clear.

Because he'd never feel his master, on his back again ...!

John Stuart rides on forever there ... I don't find that at all strange.


Now some gaze upon this photo, and they often question me,

Replacement Memorial Plaque Dedication Service. Puckapunyal

20th March 2022

On a very nice Autumn morning, once getting through security, we were greeted by many Army personnel who directed the visitors to the car park area and assisted at the seating area of the State Memorial Garden. The grounds surrounds were in very well groomed condition. Probably the best that I had seen it. The 5/6 RVR Pipes and Drums Band led the March which had a good number of members marching and were guided down the hill by the RSM School of Artillery, WO1 Gav. Mura. It was a good sight. The Salute was taken by Lt Col Matthew Hodda assisted by Maj Gen Jim Barry OAM RFD.

Around 30 of our Sub-branch members attended and we were pleased to welcome 22 members of the Barnett/Stevens family. The Dedication Service was exceptional, led by Chaplain Don Kaus. Noelene Stevens and her cousin unveiled the Plaque which is placed on a rock situated within an excellently constructed stone garden area. It is most impressive and everyone should be very pleased and proud of the outcome. Special thanks to Puckapunyal Base Senior Officers for their great support in contributing to the Service and providing at no cost, the construction of the Memorial Garden and the placement of the rock with the Plaque attached. We supplied the stainless steel Plaque with inscription. Our member Hank Kreemers arranged most of these works and has a great association with the Senior Officers at Pucka. Hank was MC of both Services. Thank you and congratulations Hank. Guest Speaker was a very appropriate Officer, Lt. Col. Matthew Hodda, C.O. School of Artillery Puckapunyal. We have obtained transcripts of both his addresses which were excellent and we will publish them. We have never before been blessed with the number of Army personnel wishing to help those who attended. I was fortunate, in that I was given the opportunity within the Service to thank those organisations and personnel who provided support to our Sub-branch in the long journey to attain the pinnacle in the Gunner Brian Arthur Barnett Story. The family now has comfort in knowing that the Plaque will be cared for forever in the dedicated Memorial Area within this wonderful Army facility called Puckapunyal. This is the third Memorial for Brian as the Subbranch back in 2009 dedicated a large wooden cross with bronze Plaque that is placed in the Chapel area of the Repat. At this time we were unaware that the Army had, on the 3rd September, 1954 dedicated a plaque in memory of Brian within Pucka. It was lost when redevelopment works were carried out in the 1960's. Now we have the Replacement Plaque.

Following the Service we moved to the Cricket Pavilion to enjoy a very nice BBQ, mixed salads and sweets lunch. This was provided free, courtesy of the Victoria State Branch. Drinks were provided by the Puckapunyal Cricket Club at very reasonable cost. Of course this time was taken up by those attending to relax and enjoy the company of so many members and their family/friends from around Victoria.

All in all, the day was most enjoyable and memorable with thanks to all involved in its arrangement.
